Unfortunately, too often we are seduced by fads, ignorant of trends, and resistant to principles.

Fads are like the spice of life, so have fun with them, but don't let those momentary things chain you to what quickly turns into an outdated past, distracting you from investing in the long-term and the eternal.

Trends need to be identified and understood so you can invest in them or reject them. They're like currents in the water; powerful, deep and directional. If a trend is good, work with it. If it's bad, then you must fight it — and resistance is not futile.

Principles are true even if you don't know them or you deny them. They can help you navigate through the fads and trends, offering guidance on how to make choices that will shape the future for you and your children.
